SCR's activities include workshops, (Rekindling the Inner Spirit to Succeed, the Male Box Group Series, Financial Literacy), a very active street presence (Speak Peace Forward and Occupy The Corners), and the installation of the first I AM PEACE Music Studio located within a Harlem High School. 

9:15 Welcome and Acknowledgements

Rosemonde Pierre-Louis, Executive Director of the NYU McSilver Institute for Poverty Policy and Research

Rosemonde Pierre-Louis is a highly recognized public sector leader, known for driving social and economic change. She is Executive Director of the NYU McSilver Institute for Poverty Policy and Research, which is committed to disrupting generational poverty through research, policy and action. From 2014-2016, she served as the Senior Adviser to the NYC Commission on Gender Equity (CGE) and prior to that served as Commissioner of the Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence. In 2006, Ms. Pierre-Louis became the first Haitian-American in New York City's history to serve as Manhattan Deputy Borough President and served in this capacity until 2013. Prior to entering government Ms. Pierre-Louis practiced law for 17 years and served in leadership positions within legal services organizations representing survivors of intimate partner violence. In April 2022, she was appointed by New York's Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) to a blue ribbon "Fareness" panel to address solutions to reduce fare evasion.

Cheryl Greenberg, Paul E. Raether Distinguished Professor of History, Trinity College

Cheryl Greenberg is the Paul E. Raether Distinguished Professor of History at Trinity College in Hartford, CT. She teaches and writes on twentieth century African American political activism, race relations, the Civil Rights Movement and civil liberties. Her first book, 'Or Does It Explode?" Black Harlem in the Great Depression, relied heavily on materials from both the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture and the Mayor's Commission on Conditions in Harlem, she is delighted to be part of this conference.

William M. Rodgers III, Vice President and Director of the Institute for Economic Equity, Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis

William M. Rodgers III is vice president and director of the Institute for Economic Equity at the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis. Before joining the Fed, Rodgers served as professor of public policy and chief economist at the Heldrich Center for Workforce Development at Rutgers University. His areas of expertise include compensation, pay equity, diversity and inclusion, labor market and general economic trends.

Dr. Blake — nationally known as the Hip Hop Principal and president of Black Edfluencers-United (BE-U) is a sought-after speaker about issues in urban education and community development. He initiated a bold and daring self-created project to integrate a conceptualized hip-hop based educational program. As a result of his efforts, his school went from one of the lowest-performing schools in the district to #1 in reading and math. Dr. Blake also served as Chair of the Education and Youth Committee of the Million Man March Coordinating Council of Queens, He has spent over 25 years working to empower communities through social action. Currently, he is the host of a popular educational podcast titled "The Classroom Hip Hop 101 with Dr. Blizzy." Dr. Blake has been featured on The Oprah Winfrey Show, People Magazine, 98.7 Kiss FM, The Joey Reynolds Show, WABC Channel 7 News, and WCBS Channel 2 News for his work.

Pauline Toole serves as the Commissioner of the New York City Department of Records and Information Services (DORIS), the agency responsible for preserving, protecting and making publicly available City government's historical and current materials. This includes establishing conversation groups for English Language Learners, launching the City's first Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Coalition and coordinating the start-up of the New York Capital Defender Office that provided defense attorneys in death penalty cases.

Kim Phillips-Fein, the Robert Gardiner-Kenneth T. Jackson Professor of History, Columbia University

Over the years she has served as a member of the Consortium on African American Education, the African American Leadership Summit and the Coalition for Excellence in Black Education and on the boards of Community School District Five, Operation Open City, the Harlem Red Cross, the Harlem Education Roundtable and WE ACT for Environmental Justice. Ms. Smith is currently President of the West 130th Street Homeowners Association and an advisory member of the Greater Harlem Coalition and Hit The Books. She gained private, public and non-profit sector experience at Union Carbide, Revlon, the NYC Housing Partnership, Harlem Commonwealth Council and the Harlem Business Alliance.

Curtis L. Archer, President, Harlem Community Development Corporation

Since January 2006, Curtis Archer has served as President of the Harlem Community Development Corporation. He sees his role as essential in enhancing the economic climate for both businesses and residents in the Greater Harlem community.
